Redistricting Brings 2nd District Changes

According to Alderman Davis, the redistricting process completed earlier this fall by the Common Council will mean new 2012 voting wards, polling locations, and district boundaries for aldermanic districts, including the 2nd District.

Effective in April 2012:

- The area bounded by Appleton Ave., 107th St., Daphne St., the Little Menomonee River and 91st St. has been moved from the 5th District to the 2nd District.
- Also added to the district is the area bounded by W. Silver Spring Dr., N. 55th St., W. Custer Ave. and N. 64th St. The southeastern border of the 2nd District now follows W. Fond du Lac Ave and W. Capitol Dr., with the areas east and south of these streets now in the 7th district.
- All voting wards within the district have been renumbered, and several have had their boundaries altered.

Voter Identification Laws Have Changed

A new law in the state of Wisconsin requires that all voters show valid identification at the polls. The law is not officially in effect until the spring primary election, Tuesday, February 21, 2012.

Valid forms of identification include:

- A Wisconsin driver's license, even if driving privileges are suspended/revoked
- A Wisconsin DOT identification card
- A military ID card issued by a U.S. uniformed service
- A U.S. Passport
- Any of the above identifications must have an expiration date after the November 2, 2010 election.
- A certificate of naturalization that was issued not earlier than two years before the date of an election at which it is presented
- An unexpired driving receipt issued by Wisconsin DOT
- An unexpired identification card receipt issued by Wisconsin DOT
- An identification card issued by a federally recognized Indian tribe in WI
- An unexpired identification card issued by a Wisconsin-accredited university or college that contains the following:
 - Date of Issuance
 - Signature of Student
 - Expiration date not later than two years after Date of Issuance

If you do not have any of the above identification, you may obtain a FREE identification card from the Wisconsin Department of Transportation. For more on obtaining proper identification for voting, please look to www.milwaukee.gov/election or contact my office at 286-3762.

Forum on Black Male Achievement



The two-hour forum on black male achievement, sponsored by the City of Milwaukee in partnership with UW-Milwaukee, was held in UWM's Student Union Ballroom East, and attracted more than 100 participants.

Alderman Joe Davis, Sr. served as the host of local and national experts as they took part in a community forum on black male achievement last May at the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee. Mayor Tom Barrett and Dr. Marc Levine, a senior fellow and the founding director of the Center for Economic Development who teaches in the Department of History and the Urban Studies Programs at UW-Milwaukee, were the featured speakers.

The forum was scheduled after the Open Society Institute selected Milwaukee as one of six U.S. cities where an in-depth study of black male achievement would be conducted.

Others who participated included: Leon Andrews – National League of Cities; John Chisholm – Milwaukee County District Attorney; Jeff Street – CoMission Against Diseases of Poverty; Diann Dawson – United States Department of Health & Human Services; Alderman Ashanti Hamilton – 1st District, City of Milwaukee; Victor Barnett – Running Rebels; Jim Bartos – Silver Spring Neighborhood Center; Sharlen Moore – Urban Underground; Terrance Ray – Milwaukee Fatherhood Initiative; and Pastor Christian Winkel – Lighthouse Youth Center.

Council: Implement Recommendations of the Disparity Study

In October the Common Council approved an ordinance co-sponsored by Alderman Davis implementing the recommendations of the city disparity study by redesigning the city's emerging business enterprise program as minority, woman and small business enterprise programs. The action also created an Office of Small Business Development to implement and oversee these programs.

Alderman Davis – a key proponent of the disparity study – said he believes the changes will create jobs and better opportunities for woman- and minority-owned businesses to do business with the city. “These changes are long overdue, and over time it is my belief that women and minority owned businesses will get a fairer shake and a larger piece of the pie when it comes to city contracts,” he said.

Under the recommendations approved by the Council:

- Goals for participation of minority, woman and small businesses are established for city contracting departments (the goals will be reviewed and adjusted annually with the approval of the Council).
- Certification standards for a minority business enterprise are established, including the requirement that the business be at least 51% owned, operated and controlled by one or more African-American, Asian-American, Hispanic or Native American individuals.
- Annual requirements for the participation of minority business enterprises are established.
- Certification standards for a woman business enterprise program are established, including the requirement that the business be at least 51% owned, operated and controlled by one or more non-minority women.
- Certification standards for a small business enterprise program are established, including the requirement that the business shall meet the size standards of the U.S. small business administration and that the business have a physical business address located within the limits of the Milwaukee metropolitan area for at least one year prior to certification.

D. Wilson Consulting Group, LLC was retained to conduct a disparity study for the City of Milwaukee to determine whether there was a legal basis for the city to establish a race and gender-based business enterprise program for the procurement of goods and services by the city. In December 2010, the final disparity study was completed and released for public comment.

The disparity study found that a statistically significant disparity exists between the number of minority-owned and women-owned business enterprises that are ready and able to provide goods and services, including construction, to the city and the number of those businesses that are providing goods and services, including construction, to the city. The study also found anecdotal evidence that discrimination patterns and practices have occurred with the city's procurement of goods and services.

Flooding Study Task Force Report and Recommendations

The report and recommendations of the Flooding Study Task Force were approved by the Common Council on July 6. To view the task force's report and recommendations, please visit my website at www.milwaukee.gov/district2.

The task force was created after the devastating flooding and basement backups of July 2010 resulted in millions of dollars in property damage and eventual disaster assistance from the Federal Emergency Management Agency. At that time, not only was Alderman Davis involved in the city's effort to convince FEMA to allow individual property damage claims from residents, he also held large public meetings attended by FEMA representatives, representatives from the Milwaukee Metropolitan Sewerage District, and the Department of Public Works.

The task force was charged with recommending remedies for storm water and sewage backup flooding of city residential and commercial properties, and flooding of streets and alleyways.

To date, the city – in partnership with residents and the Milwaukee Metropolitan Sewerage District (MMSD) – has initiated a pilot project to repair private sewer laterals as a cost effective approach to combating the problem of basement backups. It is possible that the pilot project could expand to other city neighborhoods where damaging basement backups have occurred during and after heavy rain events.

Earn a Bike

Changes Taking Shape at Westlawn

The Housing Authority of the City of Milwaukee is working to revitalize and redevelop the Westlawn neighborhood, which is bounded by W. Silver Spring Dr., Lincoln Creek, N. 60th St., and N. 68th St. The revitalization is taking place in several phases over several years. The work includes demolition of some buildings, renovations of other buildings, and new construction (new buildings).

Alderman Davis said the City of Milwaukee Housing Authority has an award-winning track record of reinventing and re-energizing aging housing projects to follow Livable Cities (HOPE VI) standards of urban design. Its mission for redevelopment of the Westlawn 1950s style housing project is similarly ambitious. The project plan was developed after several meetings to gather input from Westlawn residents, neighbors, businesses, and other interested parties.

The revitalization project includes a mix of housing types and will reintegrate Westlawn with its surrounding community by reconnecting the normal street grid. The physical design, while still accommodating its predominantly low-income community, will be updated to support a broader range of housing types and incomes. The residential units will include a mix of one bedroom multifamily units not more than three stories in height, as well as family units of two, three, four and five bedrooms in a combination of townhouse, side-by-side and bungalow types.

Alderman Davis said the redevelopment plan for the Westlawn neighborhood is intended to not only revitalize the neighborhood, but to serve as a catalytic project that will help spur further redevelopment in the larger Silver Spring area community.

Post Office Closings

The U. S. Postal Service (USPS) has announced its intention to assess whether closing or consolidating five post offices in the City of Milwaukee – including two that serve much of the 2nd District (Hampton and Parklawn) – is appropriate given factors that include workloads, customer demand and availability of alternative services. These five post offices are identified as the Mid City, Parklawn, Teutonia, Hampton and Dr. Martin Luther King facilities, all located in primarily African-American neighborhoods serving approximately 160,000 city residents.

The public comment period for residents to voice their concerns about the possible closures ends December 7, 2011. To provide input, go to one of the five affected stations, fill out a comment form and submit it at the counter. To submit comment forms or letters by mail, please mail them by December 7 to: District Discontinuance Coordinator, 350 W. St. Paul Ave. Suite 650, Milwaukee, WI 53203.

Alderman Davis and the Council passed a resolution that urges the Postmaster General of the United States and the U.S. Postal Regulatory Commission to maintain affordable, secure and dependable postal services in the city. Additionally, a number of public meetings have been hosted to generate feedback for the USPS to aid us in this process.


Many of the neighborhoods that would be affected by the possible post office closures have already had delivery stoppages because of several concerns, and USPS mailboxes in many of them have been removed or relocated according to Alderman Davis, which is why the facilities are needed more than ever.

Report Vacant Property Problems

If you see boards removed from windows or any suspicious/unusual activity at a vacant foreclosed property in your neighborhood, please call the Milwaukee Police Department non-emergency number – **(414) 933-4444** immediately.

Alderman Davis said thieves will dismantle and remove copper tubing to sell for scrap, and sometimes will even steal a home's furnace and/or air conditioning system and attempt to re-sell them.

If you notice tall weeds or grass, accumulating litter/debris, or unshoveled sidewalks at a vacant property, please call **(414) 286-2489** and report it. Your assistance will increase the effectiveness of our collective efforts to minimize the negative effects of foreclosed properties in your neighborhood.

City of Milwaukee Youth Council Shines Bright

When Alderman Davis came up with the idea of creating the City of Milwaukee Youth Council, he did so after talking at length with young people in the city. "I asked many young people about their thoughts and suggestions on issues such as cruising, and I was struck by their thoughtfulness, intelligence and willingness to provide input," he said. "I quickly realized that young Milwaukeeans have innovative ideas about improving conditions for themselves and their peers, and that their opinions have substance and merit."

Since being approved by the Common Council in 2004, the Youth Council has successfully deliberated and taken action on important issues affecting the health, safety, and welfare of young people in Milwaukee. The Youth Council regularly meets at City Hall, but members also discuss issues by talking to peers, family, and neighbors. To name just a few, the Council has: lobbied against fare increases and cuts in county bus funding; has gained Common Council approval of a measure opposing the marketing of a high-alcohol malt beverage to Milwaukee young people (and limiting its sales and marketing in the City of Milwaukee); traveled to Washington, D.C. to meet with members of Congress and to attend the National League of Cities' Congressional Cities Conference; has allocated \$25,000 in block grant funding to Milwaukee agencies that specialize in youth intervention, leadership, and education; and has talked about youth behavior and mall policy with the general manager of Mayfair Mall.

Alderman Davis said he believes the Youth Council is molding some of Milwaukee's future leaders. "It's exciting to see how involved and how engaged the Youth Council has been on so many issues, and I believe the boldness the body possesses is a positive sign of things to come for Milwaukee," he said.

Youth Council members represent young people in their aldermanic districts, and they regularly meet with leaders like the Mayor, Common Council, County Executive, School Superintendent, city department heads, business owners, and community groups to advocate for youth. The community is invited to attend all meetings and most meetings are broadcast on the city's government television station – Channel 25 (online at www.milwaukee.gov/CityChannellive - and found on Channel 25 on Time Warner Cable and on Channel 99 on AT&T U-Verse in the city of Milwaukee).

The Youth Council is looking for committed young leaders between the ages of 14-18 with the time, energy, and passion to work for change. Youth Council members must live in the City of Milwaukee. Go to www.milwaukee.gov/YouthCouncil to learn more about becoming a member.


NEWLY ACCEPTED ITEMS IN BLUE

The city's new single sort recycling program is now in effect. Single sort recycling is a system that allows all recyclables to be mixed together in the recycling cart or bin. It means that only one sort is necessary – separating all the recyclables from trash. Papers and containers no longer need to be kept separate. Special equipment will be used to separate them once they reach a recycling facility. *However, it does NOT mean that garbage and recyclables may be mixed together.*

Important points for Milwaukee residents:

- New items are added to the list of accepted materials (see graphic above).
- Single sort offers increased convenience for residents.
- Single sort brings increased revenue to the city.
- Single sort allows the use of the same type of truck to collect either garbage or recycling on a given day, meaning the city can serve residents more efficiently.
- Cart dividers will be removed from carts throughout the city. This will be a gradual process, and the dividers will be recycled.
- This change supports the goal of reaching 40% diversion from landfill by 2020.

Alderman Davis Partners with City Agencies to Avert Health Hazard



Following through on a complaint call received in late September from a constituent, Alderman Davis promptly engaged the Department of Neighborhood Services (DNS) to respond to a massive bedbug infestation at the Diamond Inn, 6222 W. Fond du Lac Ave. Within 24 hours, DNS inspectors examined the property—specifically the eight rooms listed in the complaint—and found evidence of a bedbug infestation.

“The Department of Neighborhood Services has acted on this property before, citing the owner for these problems, but frequently the owners do the minimal response to rectify the code violations,” Alderman Davis said. “But when the complaints include children coming out of what is their home covered in significant numbers of bites, it’s time for the city to take further action.”

Alderman Davis said that although the city is working with limited resources, the health and safety of children is a primary goal.

“Children don’t need to be raised like this,” Alderman Davis said. “We can, through city partnerships and fast action, work to ensure—at the minimum—quality shelter for our youth.”

Davis praised the work of the Department of Neighborhood Services and acknowledges that city agencies often work in partnerships. “DNS has repeatedly used its tools on this property owner. But there is also a public health issue at stake here, which gives us the opportunity to call on the Health Department for their resources as well,” Davis said.

“Another partnership we can cultivate is one with the press and public,” the Alderman said. “The city effectively deploys its tactics, but awareness is also key and that’s where the press comes in. Alerting the public to these situations helps to ensure that meeting health and safety standards for our children and families is something we can all demand.”

Winter Garbage & Recycling Collection

Garbage and recycling collection schedules will change in the winter due to the management of snow and ice by city crews. Schedule changes will begin December 5th. Residents must clear snow and ice to provide access to carts.

If you have curbside collection: Carts will be retrieved from yards during winter months. Extra items must still be placed curbside for pickup.

If you have alley collection: Carts will continue to be serviced at the alley line.

NOTE: There is a \$50 charge for collection of trash piles larger than one cubic yard (roughly the same size of an easy chair).

No Garbage or Recycling Collection on City Holidays

It should be noted that no garbage or recycling will be collected on the following days this calendar year:

- **Christmas Eve & Day**
Friday & Monday – December 23 & 26, 2011
- **New Years Eve & Day** – Friday & Monday
December 30, 2011 & January 2, 2012

Monday – January 16, 2012

Holiday Tree Disposal

Garbage collection crews will pick up the tree if it is placed where the garbage is collected. If your collection is in an alley, trees must be placed at the alley line for collection, not on the street. Only residents whose garbage is collected from the street may place their tree at the curb to be picked up.

The Self-Help Centers winter hours, November 27, 2011 through April 7, 2012, are 7:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m., Tuesday through Saturday. They will be closed on Sundays, Mondays and city holidays. For more information visit www.milwaukee.gov/selfhelpcenters.

Winter Parking

No overnight parking is allowed on through highways and mass transit (bus) routes from December 1 to March 1. These streets are not posted. For a list of these streets please go to the Winter Parking Regulations section at www.milwaukee.gov/parkingregulations. In case of a "Snow Emergency" prior to December 1 or after March 1, vehicles must be moved to a side street and must be legally parked in conformity with all other regulations on the proper side of the street.

Please Shovel Your Sidewalks

A reminder that property owners and occupants are required by city law to clear sidewalks abutting their property of snow or ice within 24 hours after the snow and ice have stopped falling. Failure to do so could result in the city doing it and charging you.


