## Dear 9th District Residents,

First, I would like to invite you to my town hall meeting (see details in article on this page) at Direct Supply, Inc. on November 29. One of the topics I expect to be discussed at that meeting is the recently completed redistricting process. The redistricting changes approved earlier this fall by the Common Council will bring new voting wards, polling locations, and other changes that you can read about on page 2 of this newsletter.

During my service at City Hall as your representative on the Common Council I have championed economic development as a means of sparking business and commercial activity, and also as a way for the city to build its tax base. A healthy and robust city tax base helps reduce property taxes for residents, and it usually means more job opportunities for workers. On pages 4 and 5, you can read about some of the positive business developments in the 9th District.

During my tenure I have also strongly supported eliminating waste and inefficiency and I have supported initiatives that make city services more cost effective and more valuable to residents.

With that in mind I am pleased to welcome the city's new single sort recycling program. The single sort system allows all recyclables to be mixed together in the recycling cart or bin. Papers and containers no longer need to be kept separate. The change will result in an increase in revenue for the city and it supports the city's goal of reaching 40% waste diversion from landfills by 2020. On page 3 you will get an update on the Flooding Study Task Force, which my colleagues and I created after the devastating flooding of the summer of 2010.

Also in this newsletter you'll see updates on the new Miracle League Field and new traffic lights at a busy 9th District intersection, as well as what you need to know about the state's new voter identification law. As always, there is also helpful sanitation and snow removal information.

## Redistricting Brings 9th District Changes

According to Alderman Puente, the redistricting process completed earlier this fall by the Common Council will mean new 2012 voting wards, polling locations, and district boundaries for aldermanic districts, including the 9th District. Although ward numbers have changed, the Election Commission will only notify you if your polling location or Aldermanic District has changed.

### Effective in April 2012:

The area of the 9th District south of W. Silver Spring Dr. will be in the 1st and 2nd Aldermanic Districts (the area east of N. 55th St. is now in the 1st District, and the area to the west is now in the 2nd District).

The eastern boundary of the district is now N. 43rd St., and the area bounded by N. 43rd St., W. Mill Rd., N. 51st St. and W. Good Hope Rd. will move from the 1st District to the 9th District.

All voting wards within the district have been renumbered, and several have had their boundaries altered.

## Voter Identification Laws Have Changed

A new law in the state of Wisconsin requires that all voters show valid identification at the polls. The law goes into effect with the **spring primary election, Tuesday, February 21, 2012.**

### Valid forms of identification include:

- A Wisconsin driver's license, even if driving privileges are suspended/revoked
- A Wisconsin DOT identification card
- A military ID card issued by a U.S. uniformed service
- A U.S. Passport

*Any of the above identifications must have an expiration date after the November 2, 2010 election.*

- A certificate of naturalization that was issued not earlier than two years before the date of an election at which it is presented
- An unexpired driving receipt issued by Wisconsin DOT
- An unexpired identification card receipt issued by Wisconsin DOT
- An identification card issued by a federally recognized Indian tribe in WI
- An unexpired identification card issued by a Wisconsin-accredited university or college that contains the following:
  - Date of Issuance
  - Signature of Student
  - Expiration date not later than two years after Date of Issuance

If you do not have any of the above identification, you may obtain a FREE identification card from the Wisconsin Department of Transportation. ## Flooding Study Task Force Report & Recommendations

The task force was created after the devastating flooding and basement backups of July 2010 resulted in millions of dollars in property damage and eventual disaster assistance from the Federal Emergency Management Agency. The task force was charged with recommending remedies for storm water and sewage backup flooding of city residential and commercial properties, and flooding of streets and alleyways.

To date, the city – in partnership with residents and the Milwaukee Metropolitan Sewerage District (MMSD) – has initiated a pilot project to repair private sewer laterals as a cost effective approach to combating the problem of basement backups. It is possible that the pilot project could expand to other city neighborhoods where damaging basement backups have occurred during and after heavy rain events.

## Miracle League of Milwaukee

The Miracle League was started in the Atlanta area in 1999 to provide a safe baseball field/complex for children with physical or mental disabilities. The league is for those 4-19 years of age. The complexes are built to include a custom-designed field with a

cushioned rubberized surface to help prevent injuries, wheelchair accessible dugouts, and a completely flat surface to eliminate any barriers to wheelchair-bound or visually impaired players. There are more than 200 local Miracle Leagues across the country with more than 100 currently under construction.

The Milwaukee Miracle Field is located on the grounds of the John C. Cudahy YMCA, 9050 N. Swan Road. They held two sessions this year, one in August and the other September 6 - October 8. This year there was an informal structure and players were assigned to teams on each game day. In 2012, there will be a complete summer of baseball with players assigned to teams and coaches. All players are partnered with volunteers (known as "buddies"). Each player bats once per inning, is always safe on the bases, and scores a run every inning. Each team and player wins every game.

## Basement Backup: The Video



A 7-minute video released by the Milwaukee Metropolitan Sewerage District shows how excess flows of storm water in private sanitary sewer laterals can contribute to sewage backups in basements.

Flows of storm water from rain and melting snow can enter laterals through cracks or from foundation drains connected to the pipes. The excess water drains to municipal sanitary sewers beneath streets.

When the clear water fills the municipal sewers, those pipes stop flowing and wastewater backs up like traffic on a congested freeway, according to municipal officials interviewed for the video project. The wastewater pushes back through laterals into basements. Visit the MMSD Basement Connection website at <http://basementconnection.mmsd.com> to view the video.

MMSD has established a 10-year, \$156 million program to replace or repair leaky laterals and to disconnect foundation drains from laterals.

# BUSINESS DEVELOPMENTS

## Alderman Puente Working to Help Foster Business Development

### RES Manufacturing

RES Manufacturing, 7801 N. 73rd St., was recently awarded a five-year contract to provide multiple stamped parts and assemblies for Tesla Motors of Palo Alto, California, for their Model S sedan. The Model S is an electric vehicle with a range of 300 miles on a single charge. RES was chosen over a number of other U.S. and foreign entities, including one of Tesla's current suppliers in China. The RES facility is 95,000 square feet and they currently have 90 employees.

### ETE Reman

ETE REMAN is one of the largest transmission remanufacturers in the United States. They currently have a manufacturing facility at 8155 N. 76th St. and have purchased the old Pick 'n Save property at 7830 W. Good Hope Rd. in order to increase their manufacturing capacity. Plans for the conversion of the current building and a possible building expansion are being developed.

### Diamond Precision Products

Johnson Creek-based Diamond Precision Products purchased the property at 11000 W. Heather Ave. for a multi-million dollar expansion of their operations. They make precision components for various commercial and industrial applications and develop optimal machining systems. Having recently landed several new contracts, it was determined that they needed more space. Retaining 85 positions, they expect to create approximately 100 new jobs over the next few years.

### G. Mirch Masala

Featuring Pakistani and northern Indian cuisine, G. Mirch Masala, 7225 N. 76th St., opened in February. Located in the old "King and I" location, G. Mirch Masala has a children's menu, vegetarian and vegan options, and lunch and dinner buffets. Takeout is also available. There is a banquet room on the lower level.

### Pferd Advance Brush

Pferd Advance Brush opened a new distribution center and production facility at 9201 W. Heather Ave. in June. They are a wholly owned subsidiary of August Rüggeberg GmbH & Co., a family-owned business based in Marienheid, Germany. The Rüggeberg Company itself was founded in 1799. They have earned a reputation as one of the world's leaders in the design and manufacture of quality grinding, cutting, metalworking and power tools and power brushes, maintenance brushes and accessories.

After careful consideration, Pferd (which means horse in German), decided to consolidate production in Milwaukee due to a strong workforce, good transportation and a central location in North America. Their other operations were in Leonminster, Massachusetts and in Menomonee Falls.

Pferd has made several long-term investments in this facility, not only to the building, but by purchasing advanced production equipment. The company did this without seeking any governmental financing. Pferd employs about 80 people.

### Brynwood Country Club

In the fall of 2009, Brynwood Country Club, 6200 W. Good Hope Rd., merged into the Wisconsin Club. Members of each club received access to the other location. The Wisconsin Club, which operates a facility in downtown, recently purchased the Brynwood property. They plan to improve the facilities including remodeling the locker rooms and exercise facility and purchase new maintenance equipment for the golf course. With the purchase of the Brynwood property, the Wisconsin Club will be one of only 3 private clubs in the country that offers both a downtown location and a golf course.



**Silver Spring Terrace/Autozone** As part of the revitalization of the Silver Terrace Shopping Center on the south east corner of 60th and Silver Spring, Autozone will have a store in the shopping center.

## Job Corps

Open since January, the Milwaukee Job Corps facility, 6665 N. 60th St., is fully operational and has now reached its capacity of 300 students and has a waiting list of at least 75. Students must meet federal poverty income guidelines, be between 18 and 24 years old, and go through an admissions process which includes an interview and background check.

Applicants to the Job Corps program are matched with a center that offers their preferred job training program. The Milwaukee campus - the 125th Job Corps Center to open - offers job training in welding, cement masonry, HVAC, material handling, computer numerical control machines used in manufacturing, and in certified nursing assistance.

The Milwaukee facility is operated for the United States Department of Labor by MINACT Inc., a private firm that also runs other centers.

The Milwaukee Job Corps facility was named as a Top Project of 2011 by The Daily Reporter and also received a Mayor's Design Award earlier this year. The Mayor's Design Awards are presented to recognize design excellence throughout the city of Milwaukee. Recipients have added value to their neighborhoods by restoring, constructing or enhancing their properties in a way that respects the urban fabric and contributes to the character of their surroundings.

## Glenbrook Apartments




Originally built in 1993, the Glenbrook Apartments, 9151 N. Jadam Lane, were purchased in 2006 by CommonBond Communities, the region's largest nonprofit housing developer, manager and service provider. The apartments were in need of work and updating. In 2010, using a combination of funding sources including federal stimulus funds, Glenbrook was transformed to like-new condition.

CommonBond revitalized this community by investing \$8 million in 72 apartments creating sustainable homes to serve families and children. Improvements include new energy efficient windows, siding, security system, kitchens, baths, flooring, lighting, and the addition of a stand alone Advantage Center building, available to all residents, to support residents' goals for stability, advancement and independence.

CommonBond has a history of successful development projects that have produced high quality living environments for low and moderate income families. The rehabilitation of the Glenbrook Apartments only continues their efforts in providing safe, clean, high quality affordable housing opportunities.

The city's new single sort recycling program is now in effect. Single sort recycling is a system that allows all recyclables to be mixed together in the recycling cart or bin. It means that only one sort is necessary – separating all the recyclables from trash. **Papers and containers no longer need to be kept separate.** Special equipment will be used to separate them once they reach a recycling facility.

*However, it does NOT mean that garbage and recyclables may be mixed together.*

### Important points for Milwaukee residents:

- New items are added to the list of accepted materials (see graphic above)
- Single sort offers increased convenience for residents
- Single sort brings increased revenue to the city
- Single sort allows the use of the same type of truck to collect either garbage or recycling on a given day, meaning the city can serve residents more efficiently.
- Cart dividers will be removed from carts throughout the city. This will be a gradual process, and the dividers will be recycled.
- This change supports the goal of reaching 40% diversion from landfill by 2020

### Unacceptable Materials:

- Mirrors and window or auto glass
- Ceramics, porcelain, china, & drinking glasses
- Glass cookware/bake ware
- Household items (toasters, microwaves, etc.)
- Styrofoam or foam packaging material
- Needles & Sharps, other medical waste
- Plastic bottles that contained motor oil or antifreeze
- Food soiled paper (clean pizza boxes are accepted)
- Light bulbs
- Unmarked plastics
- Plastic bag & film
- Coat hangers
- Batteries
- Tissue & paper towels
- Trash

### Preparation Guidelines:

- Food & beverage containers must be emptied and rinsed
- Flatten cardboard boxes
- Place extra recyclables next to cart
- Shredded paper must be placed either in clear plastic bags (tied off) or in paper bags (rolled and stapled shut)

## Pet Waste – Leash Laws

Let's face it, there are few experiences as aromatically unpleasant as stepping on dog poop. And, if a lazy or uncaring dog owner leaves it on your grass or in a park area, then it's no accident.

But not only is it unsightly, pet waste left on the lawn or next to the sidewalk washes into storm drains which carries it directly into our rivers and Lake Michigan.

Please, on behalf of your neighbors, double-bag pet waste in plastic bags. Seal the bags and then put them in the green garbage cart. If you have any questions, call 286-CITY (2489).

Alderman Puente would also like to remind residents that city law prohibits an owner from permitting an animal to be at large. In other words, dogs must be leashed at all times except when they are confined in a fenced yard. Cat owners must also keep cats confined or on a leash, and it is illegal to let cats be at large.

## IRS Warns of 'Free Money' Scam

The IRS is warning residents to be alert to a scam hitting the Milwaukee area. The scam encourages people to file tax returns, for a fee, to get a refund, rebate or stimulus check based on withholding from Social Security benefits. But the claim is often based on inaccurate or false information.

People are being victimized by paying the scammer a fee to prepare the returns, only to find out their claims are rejected or they have to return the money to the IRS, plus potential penalties and interest. The scam targets seniors and low income individuals. The IRS reminds taxpayers that if you can't verify all the information on a tax return, don't sign it.

## Not Too Late To Make Plans For Winter

**A**lthough winter is still several weeks away in Milwaukee, when it arrives we can expect snow emergencies. Alderman Puente wants to remind all residents of some of the requirements during snow and ice control operations.

Remember that public safety is the first priority during snow and ice control on the city's 1,400 miles of city streets. Streets are prioritized based on traffic volume, public transportation routes, access to emergency services and schools.

### The Response Depends On The Storm

The Department of Public Works will use only one or two salt trucks to tackle intermittent salting of isolated slippery spots, but a full scale plowing for a big storm will use more than 360 pieces of equipment, supplemented by private contractors. The most common operation is a General Ice Control in which 90 salt trucks are sent out citywide.

During a major storm, a General Plowing is called and may take 12 to 18 hours to complete the initial plowing followed by several more days cleaning up after parked cars, touching up intersections and widening streets.

### Please Shovel Your Sidewalks

A reminder that property owners and occupants are required by city law to clear sidewalks abutting their property of snow or ice within 24 hours after the snow and ice have stopped falling. Failure to do so could result in the city doing it and charging you.

### Move Your Car To Help Snow Removal

The single biggest problem during major snowstorms is parked and abandoned cars. The plows try to get as close to the curb as they can but those "snowbirds" get in the way and prevent them from completing the job. Alderman Puente asks that you move your vehicles so plows can clear the streets curb to curb. Remember it is illegal to park in one place for more than 24 hours.

The Milwaukee Public Schools make a number of school playgrounds available for overnight parking during snow emergencies. Call 286-CITY (2489) for the location of a playground nearest your home.

### Holiday Tree Disposal

Garbage collection crews will pick up the tree if it is placed where the garbage is collected. If your collection is in an alley, trees must be placed at the alley line for collection, not on the street. Only residents whose garbage is collected from the street may place their tree at the curb to be picked up. Trees may also be taken to the Self-Help Centers located at 3879 W. Lincoln Ave. or 6660 N. Industrial Rd. where they will be composted or turned into mulch.

The **Self-Help Centers** winter hours, November 27, 2011 through April 7, 2012, are 7:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m., Tuesday through Saturday. They will be closed on Sundays, Mondays and city holidays. In addition to the city's Self-Help Centers, private locations in the Milwaukee area may also accept unwanted items.

### "Hardship" Assistance Can Help

Is shoveling your sidewalk after a big Milwaukee snowstorm a "mission impossible" because of age or disability? Alderman Puente wants you to know that city sanitation workers may be able to give you a helping hand. If you are a senior citizen or disabled and living in a single-family, owner-occupied home, and physically unable to do the shoveling, you may be eligible for "hardship" assistance.

#### Eligibility requirements:

- Resident must own the home
- Others in home must also be unable to shovel
- Only the public sidewalk is cleared, no driveways
- Shoveling done only when full city-wide plow
  - snowfall total at least 4 inches
- \$10 per event - put on property tax bill
- Call Sanitation Division at 286-3345 for application

### Winter Garbage & Recycling Collection

Garbage and recycling collection schedules will change in the winter due to the management of snow and ice by city crews. Schedule changes will begin December 5, 2011 and end April 13, 2012. Residents must clear snow and ice to provide access to carts.

**If you have curbside collection:** Carts will be retrieved from yards during winter months. Extra items must still be placed curbside for pickup.

**If you have alley collection:** Carts will continue to be serviced at the alley line.




*NOTE: There is a \$50 charge for collection of trash piles larger than one cubic yard (roughly the same size of an easy chair).*

It should be noted that no garbage or recycling will be collected on the following dates:

- **Thanksgiving**
  - Thursday & Friday – November 24 & 25, 2011
- **Christmas Eve & Day**
  - Friday & Monday – December 23 & 26, 2011
- **New Years Eve & Day**
  - Friday & Monday – December 30, 2011 & January 2, 2012
- **Martin Luther King, Jr. Day**
  - Monday – January 16, 2012

No overnight parking is allowed on through highways and mass transit (bus) routes from December 1 to March 1. These streets are not posted. In case of a "Snow Emergency" prior to December 1 or after March 1, vehicles must be moved to a side street and must be legally parked in conformity with all other regulations on the proper side of the street.

## Youth Council Making Most of Opportunity

Since it was approved by the Common Council in 2004, the City of Milwaukee Youth Council has successfully deliberated and taken action on important issues affecting the health, safety, and welfare of young people in Milwaukee.

The Youth Council regularly meets at City Hall, but members also discuss issues by talking to peers, family, and neighbors. Just a few things the Council has done this term: lobbied against fare increases and cuts in county bus funding; allocated \$25,000 in block grant funding to Milwaukee agencies that specialize in youth intervention, leadership, and education; and talked about youth behavior and mall policy with the general manager of Mayfair Mall.

Alderman Puente said he believes the Youth Council is molding some of Milwaukee's future leaders. "The Youth Council has been asking tough questions and sharing some new and insightful ideas on many issues, and I believe that is a positive sign of things to come for Milwaukee," he said.

Youth Council members represent young people in their aldermanic districts, and they regularly meet with leaders like the Mayor, Common Council, County Executive, School Superintendent, city department heads, business owners, and community groups to advocate for youth. The community is invited to attend all Youth Council meetings and most meetings are broadcast on the city's government television station - Channel 25 on Time Warner Cable and Channel 99 on AT&T U-Verse.
