

Alverno Seeing \$30 Million Campus Transformation

On March 18th, Alverno College broke ground on a \$30 million expansion and renovation. This is the most significant transformation the Catholic liberal arts college has made in its 126-year history.

Construction will begin at the groundbreaking ceremony on March 18, and is expected to be finished by the end of 2015. The renovation and expansion will include a new classroom building, improvements to the JoAnn McGrath School of Nursing and the creation of a new, larger student commons area in hopes of enhancing the student experience.

The current campus was built in 1952, and with needs of students changing and enrollment numbers climbing, the college needs to “evolve to meet those needs,” says Dr. Mary J. Meehan, president of Alverno College.

Alverno College has grown into one of the largest women’s colleges in the country and many employers look to the college for future female leaders. In order to fully develop and enrich the students’ education, Alverno College needs to enhance the facilities and the curriculum.

The \$30 million expansion and renovation has been financed by a campaign started in 2011 by business leaders, Paul Purcell, CEO of Robert W. Baird, Don Layden, Partner, Quarles & Brady LLC, and Ellen Gardner, ’69, retired President of Ameritech-Wisconsin. These business leaders have seen the impact that the women of Alverno College have had in the community, and “believe deeply in Alverno and its future,” says Purcell.

“I believe the improvements to Alverno College will aid in the enrichment of the overall educational experience, directly and positively impacting our community as a whole,” said Alderman Dudzik.

Milwaukee has made Jetsetter magazine’s list of top recommended travel destinations in 2014.

S. 27th St. Reconstruction Project Underway ➤

The city's reconstruction of S. 27th St. from W. Howard Ave. to the Union Pacific Railroad bridge near W. Dakota St. was started up in late March and is expected to be completed by mid-November 2014, according to the Department of Public Works.

The project includes:

- Replacing the existing pavement with a new concrete pavement
- Widening each roadway by two (2) feet to provide a bicycle accommodation
- New curbs and gutters, driveway approaches and sidewalks at most locations
- Installing decorative crosswalks at W. Howard, W. Morgan and W. Oklahoma Avenues, and the Kinnickinnic River Parkway
- Rehabilitating the bridge over the Kinnickinnic River and the culvert under the West Loomis Road intersection. West Loomis Rd. also will be reconstructed from S. 27th St. west for about 450 feet.
- "Green" sustainable infrastructure improvements



Alderman Dudzik said the project will incorporate safety improvements along the S. 27th St. corridor, a high volume street that provides access to a thriving business district, St. Luke's Hospital, schools, churches and recreational areas. The project will include traffic signal and crosswalk improvements and upgrades to the turning lanes as recommended in a series of safety audits.

"The South 27th Street project provides an excellent opportunity for the City of Milwaukee and the Department of Public Works to continue to implement several "green infrastructure" components in our street designs," said DPW Commissioner Ghassan Korban.

"This project will include nine bio retention facilities, or bio swales, in the new boulevards as well as landscaping elements that help remove silt and pollution from storm water runoff." ■

New Crime Watch Sign Program ➤

An ordinance to establish a crime watch sign program throughout Milwaukee has recently been approved by the Common Council. Although the police have yet to set up eligibility guidelines for participation of neighborhoods, business and block watch groups, provisions for the three types of crime watch signs have already been made.

The three types of signs that will be put in for the program will be those installed at locations along the perimeter of participating neighborhood crime watch areas, those installed in a business watch area and signs installed on individual blocks.

The chief of police has yet to establish standards for the size, placement, wording, etc. for all of the signs, but that is said to be happening soon.

Residents will be glad to know that the Department of Public Works will be installing these signs at no cost to the participating neighborhood association, business group or block club. They will be responsible though, for any sign fabrication costs that may come up in the future.

Any neighborhood association, business or block watch group interested in participation in the crime watch sign program should apply to the police department through the community liaison officer at the nearest district police station. ■

Project Clean and Green ➤

Project Clean & Green will be held again this spring, allowing residents of the 11th District to leave extra materials and items out for pickup by Sanitation crews. However it should be noted that no construction materials, hazardous waste, paint, electronics, more than 5 automobile tires, or brush piles larger than 2 cubic yards (equivalent to a 6-foot sofa) will be accepted. Your items to be disposed of must be placed at your collection point on your normal pickup day.

In the 11th District, Project Clean and Green will take place from May 13 – May 19 for all residences.

No Texting While Driving – Take the Pledge! ➤

AT&T, AAA and the Wisconsin State Patrol have joined forces for the It Can Wait® movement to urge everyone – especially students and young people that text messages can and should wait until after driving.

"Texting while driving is inattentive driving at its worst, and can lead to terrible accidents with serious injuries and even worse outcomes," said Alderman Dudzik. "I urge students to take the pledge to never text behind the wheel at www.ItCanWait.com."

Wisconsin marked the third anniversary of its no-texting-while-driving ban in December 2013. The law prohibits sending an e-mail or text message while driving and imposes a fine of up to \$400. As a primary enforcement law, officers may stop and ticket drivers solely for texting and driving. Wisconsin is among 41 states that ban text messaging by all drivers. ■



We Energies Continues Utilities Upgrade Work ➤

This spring We Energies is continuing work on the replacement of aging natural gas lines with new piping that is more resistant to corrosion and earth movement. The work first ramped up in much of the 11th District last summer.

The project includes replacing pipe in the street, sidewalk and, in most instances, to homes and other buildings. In some cases, the work also may require relocation of natural gas meters. Depending on weather and other factors, the project in any given area can take up to eight weeks.

New Maximum Height for Grass and Weeds ➤

On July 23, 2013, the Common Council adopted an ordinance which shortens the maximum allowed height of grass and weeds in yards and vacant lots from nine inches to seven inches.

The ordinance change also increases the penalties for those who fall out of compliance with the grass and weeds height requirement – an attempt to address complaints about blighted and vacant properties in the city.

The Department of Public Works has received media coverage about the height change, and has also been conducting a public information campaign to alert property owners, including a DPW garbage cart tag with details about the change.
