

INCARCERATED VOTERS & VOTERS WITH A CRIMINAL HISTORY

AM I ABLE TO VOTE?

- If you have not yet been convicted or pled guilty to a felony charge, you can still vote.
- If you have fully completed your felony sentence, including probation and/or extended supervision, you are eligible to vote.
- If you have been convicted of a misdemeanor, but not a felony, you are eligible to vote. This applies if you were convicted of both a misdemeanor and a felony, have completed your sentence for the felony, and are still completing your sentence for the misdemeanor.
- If you were convicted of a felony but were pardoned, you are eligible to vote.
- If you were convicted of a felony and have not completed your sentence, including supervision and/or probation, you are NOT eligible to vote.

I AM INCARCERATED BUT ELIGIBLE TO VOTE. HOW DO I CAST MY BALLOT?

- Make sure you are registered at where you lived immediately before incarceration. You cannot use the prison or jail address as your voting address. After you are registered, you can request an absentee ballot.
- You need a copy of your photo ID to request an absentee ballot. If you do not have one, staff may assist you in obtaining one.

IF I AM INCARCERATED, CAN I REQUEST TO RECEIVE ABSENTEE BALLOTS PERMANENTLY?

- No. You may only apply to receive absentee ballots indefinitely if you are “indefinitely confined” as a result of age, physical ability, infirmity, or physical disability.
- You must request an absentee ballot for every election.

I'M ELIGIBLE TO VOTE BUT UNDER GPS MONITORING. WHAT DO I DO?

- You can request an absentee ballot, so you can still vote at home.
- If you wish to vote in-person or need to get a photo ID, you should seek special permission from the necessary individuals before doing so.
