**Creating Sustainable Prosperity for Milwaukee**

Milwaukee is the economic hub of the State of Wisconsin. It is a premiere center of advanced manufacturing, freshwater research and development, green technology, health care, biomedical technology and financial services. Milwaukee's dynamic and accessible cultural activities, diverse workforce, and natural beauty attract tourism, business and investment in large and increasing numbers. Our transportation system is a gateway for tourism, conventions, commerce and economic development with benefits statewide.

Our diverse and resilient community both supports and challenges state policy makers. Since fiscal, economic and community ties between the City and State run strong in both directions, we have identified a multitude of opportunities to invest and reinvest in Milwaukee that will reap dividends for the rest of the State. This legislative package provides numerous ways for the State to build on our inter-dependence and improve Milwaukee's future ability to thrive. It also focuses on policies that will enhance self-sustaining prosperity.

**Key Legislative Priorities**

***Stabilize the City's Fiscal Capacity and Enhance Operational Efficiency***

1. Maintain or increase all sources of intergovernmental revenue, especially shared revenue.
2. Protect and expand the City's property tax base and ensure uniform assessment practices.
3. Provide more local revenue options to reduce the reliance on the property tax.
4. Treat all municipal employees equitably with regard to pension and healthcare contributions.
5. Ensure that the City receives timely and reliable financial information from the State.
6. Protect matters of interest for city government and residents in utility rate cases.

***Promote Racial, Social and Economic Equity for City Residents***

1. Fight for a fair, accessible and equitable voting process that provides and institutionalize early voting and freedom to vote for all Milwaukee residents.
2. Promote employability and fair compensation for our residents by funding sector-based apprenticeships, youth employment programs and supporting a higher minimum wage.
3. Reduce barriers to employment through means such as better access to driver education and reducing the lasting impact of non-violent felony convictions.
4. Support programs that improve family support structures for minorities like the Fatherhood Initiative, the Black Male Achievement Council, and My Brother's Keeper.
5. Improve transitions into the workplace for the recently unemployed, underemployed, or incarcerated.
6. Support policies that promote a diverse, inclusive community regardless of immigration status.

***Strengthen our Environment, our Mobility and our Infrastructure***

1. Seek additional funding to support local road, water and sewer infrastructure improvements, with an emphasis on “fixing it first”.
2. Support alternative forms of mobility such as rail, transit, bicycles and pedestrian access.
3. Ensure residents have a comprehensive and safe transportation system that provides convenient and affordable access to jobs.
4. Invest in freight, rail, air and waterways, especially in the Port of Milwaukee, the Amtrak Hiawatha line, the 30<sup>th</sup> St. Industrial Corridor and other multi-modal initiatives.
5. Support water, park and lakeshore health and overall sustainability of our environment and natural resources.

***Invest in and Support Public Safety and Public Health***

1. Remove barriers to crime reduction by enacting policies that reduce access to illegal guns, reduce carjacking and modernize and appropriately fund the juvenile justice system.
2. Fund and support policies that reduce lead hazards from paint and water service lines.
3. Support evidence-based policies that protect our children, including expanding mental health services, veterans, and the homeless.
4. Fund and support policies regarding injury prevention, domestic violence prevention, efforts to stop human trafficking, sexual assault and harassment prevention.
5. Support collaborative efforts by stakeholders to address the opioid epidemic.

***Enhance our Neighborhoods and Economic Well Being***

1. Invest in programs that prevent foreclosure and stabilize properties and neighborhoods.
2. Support job creation and training programs and funding for apprenticeship development.
3. Increase the number and type of economic development incentives, especially those supporting catalytic economic development projects and the manufacturing industry.
4. Fund local educational institutions in a manner that is conscious of educational quality and fair to our taxpayers and support proposals from Milwaukee Public Schools.
5. Secure state support for economic attractions, cultural institutions and the convention center.

***Maintain Local Control and Flexibility***

1. Repeal previous legislative action preempting local government authority, or fund state mandates on local governments.
2. Strengthen the ability of local leaders to make decisions that affect their constituents.
3. Maintain full city control over zoning and the disposition of real estate assets.
4. Ensure fair city representation on state and regional boards and commissions like SEWRPC, MATC, 911 advisory boards, and MMSD.
5. Improve our ability to use tax incremental, business improvement and neighborhood improvement districts and other tools which enhance local fiscal health.
