2023-24 Legislative Session

Milwaukee is the economic engine of the State of Wisconsin. It continues to be a premiere hub of commerce in manufacturing, technology, healthcare, brewing industries, and professional sports. Our diverse community, natural beauty and long-established cultural activities attract visitors from near and far, generating major statewide economic benefits. In 2022, Essence Magazine named Milwaukee one of the “Luxurious Destinations That You Don't Have To Travel Far To Enjoy”. National Geographic echoed the adulation in their listing of “25 Best Places in the World to Visit in 2023”.

Our distinct and resilient community both supports and challenges state policymakers. The revenue structure allowed by the State impedes Milwaukee’s opportunity to diversify its revenue stream. Stagnate state aid continues to impact our financial condition and the sustainability of long-term obligations. An increase in financial liabilities without recognizing and accounting for the fiscal impact of those policies deepens Milwaukee’s structural imbalance.

Local governments are directly and immediately linked to citizens. Milwaukee has the direct responsibility of providing necessary daily services, solving day-to-day public problems and responding directly to the needs of its citizens. Partnership involves cooperative behavior and our partnership with the State must be strengthened for direct responses to our citizens, and visitors alike.

Intergovernmental Relations has identified a multitude of opportunities to invest and reinvest in Milwaukee that will garner dividends for the rest of the State. This legislative package identifies numerous ways and policies for the State to build on our inter-dependence and enhance Milwaukee’s self-sustaining prosperity.

Key Legislative Priorities

Maintain Local Control and Flexibility

1. Seek repeal of prior legislative actions preempting local government authority and unfunded state mandates, while opposing future incursions on local government authority.

2. Strengthen the ability of local leaders to make decisions that affect their constituents and support and strengthen measures of local control.
3. Maintain full City control over zoning and building code decisions, and the disposition of City-owned real estate assets.
4. Set our own priorities in transportation investment to have a greater voice in influencing transportation plans that satisfy City needs and objectives.
5. Ensure fair, population proportional city representation on state and regional boards and commissions like SEWRPC, MATC, 911 advisory boards, and MMSD.
6. Establish greater local flexibility for tax incremental, business improvement and neighborhood improvement districts and enhance other tools which improve local fiscal health.

Stabilize the City's Fiscal Capacity and Enhance Operational Efficiency

1. Maintain and increase all sources of intergovernmental revenue, especially shared revenue.
2. Establish new local revenue options to support the funding of City services and reduce the reliance on the property tax.
3. Protect and expand the City's property tax base and ensure uniform assessment practices.
4. Seek parity for all municipal employees on pension and healthcare contributions.
5. Ensure that the City receives timely and reliable financial information from the State.
6. Protect matters of interest for city government and residents in utility rate cases.

Promote Racial, Social and Economic Equity for City Residents

1. Support fair, accessible and equitable voting processes that provide and institutionalize early voting and unfettered ballot access to all residents.
2. Promote employability and fair compensation for our residents by funding public and private sector-based training and apprenticeships, youth employment programs, and a higher minimum wage.
3. Increase opportunities for employment by expanding access to driver's education and reducing barriers to former non-violent felony offenders.

4. Support programs that improve family support structures for minorities like the Fatherhood Initiative, the Black Male Achievement Council, and My Brother's Keeper.
5. Improve transitional services to unemployed, underemployed, or incarcerated prisoners in the areas of housing, education, mental health treatment, substance abuse counseling, employment opportunities, and healthcare.
6. Support policies that promote a diverse, inclusive community regardless of immigration status to ensure that resources are accessible to all citizens.
7. Support policies, programs, and practices that address social determinants of health and promote the reduction of racial disparities, supporting racial equity.
8. Support policies that ensure that broadband access is universal, affordable, and addresses digital equity issues.
9. Provide access to safe and affordable multimodal transportation options with equity across all communities based on need.

Strengthen our Environment, our Mobility and our Infrastructure

1. Seek additional funding to support local road, water and sewer infrastructure improvements, with an emphasis on "fixing it first".
2. Support alternative forms of mobility such as rail, public transit, bicycles and pedestrian access, with a balanced funding approach to support urban density as prescribed in SEWRPC's Vision 2050 plan.
3. Ensure residents have a comprehensive and safe transportation system that provides convenient and affordable access to jobs.
4. Invest in freight, rail, air and waterways, especially in the Port of Milwaukee, the Amtrak Hiawatha line, the 30th St. Industrial Corridor and other multi-modal initiatives. Create efficient connections between modes available for the movement of people and goods.
5. Support water, park and lakeshore health and overall sustainability of our environment and natural resources.
6. Support policies that mitigate the effects of climate change, and adaptation measures necessary to prepare for the impacts of a changing climate, including a sustainable energy policy that is equitable.
7. Support policies that addresses multi-modal needs of Ports with a focus on rail infrastructure investments.

Invest in and Support Public Safety and Public Health

1. Remove barriers to crime reduction by enacting policies that reduce access to illegal guns, reduce carjacking, and modernize and appropriately fund the juvenile justice system.
2. Fund and support policies that proportionately reduce lead hazards from paint and water service lines.
3. Support evidence-based policies that protect our children and expand services for our veterans, the homeless and persons with mental health issues.
4. Fund and support policies regarding injury prevention, domestic violence prevention, efforts to stop human trafficking, sexual assault and harassment prevention.
5. Support collaborative efforts by stakeholders to address the opioid epidemic.
6. Reevaluate laws and regulations related to public safety and crime prevention issues.
7. Fund and support Community Prosecution Units and related community-based public safety measures.
8. Support legislative changes outlined in the City-County Carjacking and Reckless Driving Taskforce.
9. Support legislation and funding for local governments shouldering the local costs of responding to the unprecedented pandemic and economic crisis.
10. Support services for mental health parity and expansion of services to address mental health needs for persons with general mental health conditions, serious mental health diagnoses, and substance use disorders.

Enhance our Neighborhoods and Economic Well Being

1. Invest in foreclosure intervention programs that prevent foreclosures and stabilize properties and neighborhoods.
2. Increase the number and type of economic development incentives, especially those supporting catalytic economic development projects and manufacturing.
3. Fund local educational institutions in a manner that is conscious of educational quality and fair to our taxpayers and support proposals from Milwaukee Public Schools. Seek increased funding for early childhood initiatives and special needs.
4. Secure state support for local economic attractions and cultural institutions.

5. Support policies that preempt disaster-related and unwarranted evictions, and enhance efforts to prevent the displacement of homeowners in neighborhoods with rapidly increasing property values.
6. Encourage efficient land use management and sensitivity to the environment and neighborhoods.
7. Support affordable homeownership, promote affordable rental housing, and provide special needs housing and transitional housing for the homeless.
8. Support comprehensive programs to raise student achievement and support positive whole child development.
