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**CHAPTER 345
DEPARTMENT OF COMMUNITY WELLNESS AND SAFETY**

345-1. Department Established. There is created a department of community wellness and safety which shall be responsible for the administration, coordination and implementation of the city's community wellness and violence prevention programs under the supervision of a community wellness and safety director. The director shall be appointed by the mayor and confirmed by the common council.

345-2. Department of Community Wellness and Safety Report. The director shall provide an annual report in the first 6 months of each calendar year of the department's impact on violence in the city to the mayor and the common council and report more frequently as the mayor or the common council may find proper. The annual report shall include:

1. The department's programs and services.
2. The status of violence-related health issues, including trends over the preceding 5 years and emerging issues.

3. An analysis of the quantifiable impact the actions of the department have had on the trends identified in sub 2 in the preceding year, including an analysis of how specific departmental actions contributed to a measurable change in the status of each violence-related health issue.

4. The department's accomplishments and challenges.

5. Initiatives undertaken or planned to be undertaken by the department.

6. Violence-related statistics and other related information.

7. Any information requested by the mayor or the common council.

345-3. Deputy Director. The community wellness and safety director may appoint a deputy, for whose acts he or she shall be responsible. Such deputy, after taking the oath of office required to be taken by his or her principal, may perform all the duties imposed by law or the ordinances of the city, on said principal; and shall likewise be subject to the same liabilities and penalties.

**CHAPTER 385
DEPARTMENT OF COMPLIANCE AND ENGAGEMENT**

385-1. Creation. There is created a department of compliance and engagement which shall be responsible for: advancing stakeholder compliance with city policies, facilitating engagement between city government and the communities it serves, and for the administration, coordination, and implementation of the city's policies relating to compliance with city ordinances. The goals of the department of compliance and engagement shall be to improve existing and new city services using a compliance framework, foster consistent reporting as required by ordinance, strengthen outreach and community engagement with city residents, and strengthen partnerships with community stakeholders.

385-3. Administration. The department of compliance and engagement shall be administered by a director of compliance and engagement. The director shall be appointed by the mayor, confirmed by the common council, and serve concurrently with the term of the mayor.

385-4. Deputy Director. The compliance and engagement director may appoint a deputy, for whose acts he or she shall be responsible. Such deputy, after taking the oath of office required to be taken by his or her principal, may perform all the duties imposed by law or the ordinances of the city, on said principal; and shall likewise be subject to the same liabilities and penalties.

385-5. Duties. Under the direction of the director of compliance and engagement, the department shall:

1. Advance city compliance and engagement initiatives.
2. Oversee contract compliance with development agreements including workforce and small business enterprise participation.
3. Prepare select equity analyses.
4. Oversee the small business enterprise program and resident preference program.
5. Oversee compliance with the Americans with Disabilities Act.
6. Provide support to the equal rights commission.
7. Oversee community outreach and engagement initiatives.
8. Assist, as may be required or requested from time to time, with federal and state nondiscrimination law compliance.

385-7. Cooperation. The director shall coordinate the activities of the department of compliance and engagement under this section with city offices, departments, boards, commissions and councils as deemed appropriate and relevant to the work of the department of compliance and engagement.

385-9. Annual Report. The director shall submit an annual written report of the activities of the department of compliance and engagement to the common council and the mayor.
