3 – The number of additional required samples divided by the total number of samples taken for a contractor. At the end of a project, an inspector collects samples of the dust in the home. If a contractor leaves lead dust behind (as measured by laboratory analysis), the contractor must return to the property to preform additional cleaning on surfaces. The inspector then returns to the site to take additional samples (re-wipe) to confirm occupant safety.

4 – MHD granted the contractor additional time to complete a project beyond the initial two weeks period.
